ADVENT A TIME FOR HOPE – AND IMAGINATION

The Lord has done great things for me, and holy is his name".
(Magnificat)

"He has brought down the powerful from their thrones and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty." (Magnificat).

As we approach the end of the Year of Hope, which ends on the Feast of Epiphany 2026, we first enter another season of Hope - Advent. It is a time when we look forward to celebrating once more the gift of God's only Son as our Redeemer. We get a really good insight into the meaning of Advent and Christmas from the Magnificat, that glorious psalm sung by Mary on receiving the news that she was to become the mother of God.

I will pick out two things from that song which really speak to me. Firstly: **“for the Lord has done great things for me, and holy is his name”**. What a wonderful expression of gratitude and of praise from the “lowly handmaid” chosen to be the mother of Jesus.

Secondly: **“He has brought down the powerful from their thrones and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty.”**

Just contrast that with the efforts of the commercial world to condition us into the belief that “The perfect Christmas” can only be achieved through consumerism - and how often we fall for it. If you think about it, the advertising industry only exists by creating discontent - we can only be happy if we spend, spend, spend (In reality, if you truly need something, no one needs to advertise it!). But true happiness is based on gratitude, the appreciation of what we have been freely given. It also comes from the contentment of doing what we know is right. The relentless advertising not only distorts our view of what Christmas is about but, worse, it paralyses our imagination about doing things differently. Pope Francis warned us about the throwaway society and yet Christmas is the biggest throwaway event of the whole year.

But it needn't be like this. The Magnificat gives us the inspiration to reclaim our imagination. Let our starting point be gratitude, giving thanks for our family, our friends, our home; and the fact that in Europe we have enjoyed 80 years of relative peace. Then contrast that with the reality of life for billions of people around the world who suffer from hunger, war and the extremes of climate.

On 1 October, Pope Leo addressed the “Raising Hope” Conference at the Vatican. He did not mince his words: “God will ask us if we have cultivated and cared for the world he created for the benefit of all and for future generations and if we have taken care of our brothers and sisters. What will be our answer?”

This is not about doom and gloom, but about a conversion to a better way of living; a liberation; a time to release our imaginations from the cult of “me first” that dominates our society. It is to put others first, as Jesus did. Doing so doesn't just transform our own lives; it brings a joy that can be infectious. Here are some seasonal ideas to help put this into practice:

Give time: This is perhaps the most precious thing we can give. It can be making more time for our own family, spending time with the lonely or helping with a charity.

Make things: Children love making things. What a great way to spend quality time with them whilst they make cards, decorations and presents. It also is a time to discuss with them what Christmas is really about and certainly a lot calmer than sitting in a traffic jam on the way to the retail park! Many of us adults do not need any more “stuff” cluttering our homes, but a thoughtful homemade present, perhaps from the kitchen, or maybe the promise of a day out is so much more personal.

Ask for or buy gifts that help others: CAFOD’s “World Gifts” which help poor communities overseas to help themselves are very popular. Buying “Fairtrade” products ensures that the producers receive a fair return for their labour. Foodbanks and countless charities also need our support.

Make trees of Gratitude and Hope: Among (or instead of) the baubles on our Christmas trees, we could hang labels on which we have written some things we are grateful for, some hopes for the future and what we are going to do to help realise those hopes. We can then invite our guests to make their own contribution to enrich our homes.

I wish you a wonderfully imaginative Advent followed by a Christmas that helps bring “Joy to the World”.

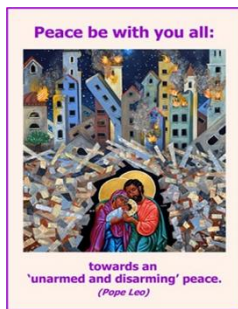

For 2026, the prayers and reflections for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity have been prepared by the faithful of the Armenian Apostolic Church, along with their brothers and sisters of the Armenian Catholic and Evangelical Churches. These resources draw upon centuries-old traditions of prayer and petitions used by the Armenian people, along with hymns that originated in the ancient monasteries and churches of Armenia, some of which date as far back as the fourth century. The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2026 extends an invitation to draw upon this shared Christian heritage and to delve more deeply into our fellowship in Christ, which unites Christians worldwide

PEACE SUNDAY JANUARY Sunday January 18th

Pope Leo has continued the exhortation of Pope Francis that the call to live nonviolent 'disarmed' lives is core to Catholic Social Teaching and the key to peace in a world scarred by violent conflict. The theme, noted the press release, "invites humanity to reject the logic of violence and war, and to embrace an authentic peace based on love and justice."

On the evening of his election to the papacy on May 8, 2025, and on several other occasions since then, Pope Leo XIV appealed for peace with a characteristic phrase—"unarmed and disarming"—to characterize the type of peace he hopes for the world.

"This peace must be unarmed, that is, not based on fear, threats or weapons," noted the press release. "And it must be disarming, capable of resolving conflicts, opening hearts and generating mutual trust, empathy and hope."

"It is not enough to call for peace," it said. "We must embody it in a way of life that rejects every form of violence, whether it be visible or systemic."

The Dicastery's press release pointed to the universal call for all humanity to seek peace, no matter our religious affiliation or role in society. "The greeting of the Risen Christ, 'Peace be with you' (Jn 20:19), is an invitation addressed to everyone—believers, non-believers, political leaders and citizens—to build the Kingdom of God and to work together to build a humane and peaceful future," concluded the statement.

"AND LET THERE BE PEACE! WORDS TO THE CHURCH AND THE WORLD"

A new book of Pope Leo's first speeches hit bookshelves in English, Italian, and Spanish on August 27th 2025. The 160-page volume released by Vatican Publishing House (Libreria Editrice Vaticana) priced at €15, contains the complete collection of Pope Leo's speeches during the first weeks of his pontificate "through which we can better understand the pontiff from his own words".



It also highlights the book's central theme of the need for peace, a call the Pope first made immediately after his election on 8 May, when he greeted crowds in St Peter's Square with the words: "Peace be with you all! Dearest brothers and sisters! This is the first greeting of the risen Christ, the Good Shepherd, who gave his life for the flock of God. I too would like this greeting peace to reach your hearts and to your families and all people, wherever they may be, to all nations, to the whole earth. Peace be with you

"This is the peace of the risen Christ, an unarmed peace, a disarming, humble, and persevering peace, which comes from God, from God who loves us all unconditionally."

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It has been noted that the date of Pope Leo XIV's election coincided with the liturgical memorial of the martyrs of Algeria, whose witness of forgiveness and reconciliation are reported to have influenced Pope Leo. Among his other inspirations is Christian de Chergé, Prior of Tibhirine, who wrote of the peace born of sacrifice and trust in God.

The Vatican has described the Pope's priorities for the Catholic Church, as expressed in the book, being "the primacy of God, communion among the faithful, and the pursuit of peace", reports ACI Prensa.

The Pope is said to have described how the Church's authority must always exist alongside self-effacement, so that those in office must, in the Pope's words, "disappear so that Christ may remain", and "make oneself small so that He may be known and glorified".

In the very first pages of the book the pontiff touches on this message of peace, self-effacement and reconciliation, describing that "our first great desire" is "a united Church, a sign of unity and communion, which would become leaven for a reconciled world".

Such appeals, Pope Leo emphasises, extend beyond political leaders to each individual heart, with the pontiff insisting that "peace begins with each one of us: with the way we look at others, listen to others, and speak of others".

Preparing for Winter

Many public buildings are again opening their doors to provide warmth and welcome in winter – loneliness and isolation being major features of modern society. As last year, there are several schemes involved in this provision, which can be a little confusing, so here's a simple guide.

i) Warm Welcome Spaces: This began as a seasonal campaign, but is now year-round. Organisations can register, and so appear on the national map; if previously registered, there is no need to re-register (though details can be updated.)

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ii) Lancashire County Council have a network of Warm Spaces: these include all county libraries, but any other public buildings, including churches, mosques, temples etc can register – and many have.

iii) Places of Welcome: a long-standing scheme, comprising a network of local community groups, including faith settings, providing places where all people feel safe to connect, belong and contribute. This is managed by the Near Neighbours network. No annual renewal needed. <https://www.placesofwelcome.org.uk/>

Faith or community groups can register with ALL of these schemes, as the criteria are essentially the same. Usefully all of these have maps showing the location of registered locations.

Healthy Neighbourhoods A report by the think-tank Theos echoes the issue of isolation, and highlights the role of faith groups; “The NHS and social care services in England are stretched to breaking point..... Yet, one in five GP appointments are not for medical reasons, but for help with issues like loneliness, housing, or debt.” Further... “faith groups across the country act as “anchors of the community” with the ability to network and convene, provide resources, buildings and volunteers, and offer pastoral and spiritual care.”

With over 700 settings across Lancashire, the faith sector makes a huge contribution to meeting acute need and addressing these wider issues of loneliness and isolation. Whilst such provision is important, to bring about truly healthy and hopeful neighbourhoods requires deeper, more systemic change, addressing the wider determinants of health – poverty, employment, housing, education – and involving a higher degree of networking between sectors than is currently the case.

Everyday choices and voices matter more than you may realize; they build a culture of dignity and fairness around us. MORE ELECTIONS - NO MORE DEMOCRACY



The Burmese military are planning new elections at the end of 2025. They will clearly be a total sham and mostly rejected internationally and domestically. The Burmese military know this but are calculating that it doesn't matter. They want to repeat what happened with the 2010 elections. Those elections were also rejected, but the international community went on to drop sanctions and support the regime it had previously described as illegitimate.

"The Burmese military likes elections almost as much as it likes coups," said Mark Farmaner, Director of Burma Campaign UK. "For the Burmese military, elections are an opportunity to rebrand, renew, and try to convince the people of Burma and the international community that reforms are finally happening. If the international community goes along with it like they did after the 2010 elections, they risk enabling military rule and human rights violations for decades to come."

The Burmese military is currently fighting for its very survival. In early 2025, the BBC estimated that the military is only in full control of around 20% of the country. Its latest administrative brand name, the State Administrative Council (SAC), has failed to gain the international legitimacy it craves.

The Burmese military needs a gamechanger. A reset. While it initially seemed that the military were being pushed into holding elections by China, the Burmese military are now deploying significant physical and propaganda resources into preparing to hold the election during December 2025 and perhaps into January 2026.

A few days after the 2021 coup, Min Aung Hlaing made a long speech about his post-coup vision. It was basically a version of the Thein Sein era, but with even tighter military control. He spoke of continued international investment, growing the economy. Incredibly, he was trying to persuade people in the country and outside that nothing would really change after the coup. As if it were just some kind of temporary blip.

While the current Burmese military leadership might not have any particular fondness for Thein Sein himself, the period appears to be a blueprint they want to repeat.

Dialogue and compromise with the military, engaging with whatever new post-election system they put in place, will be throwing a lifeline to the military at a time when it has never been weaker and people have genuine hope that they can finally be free.

Many leaders and activists in Burma have expressed the fear that the international community will pressure them to compromise with the military instead of helping them be free from the military.

There is unbearable suffering in Burma, millions of people displaced, more than half the population in poverty, most of the population living in fear. The international community should not try to use this crisis to pressure and manipulate the people of Burma into compromising with the military and coming in under the 2008 Constitution. That is a recipe for decades more conflict, human rights violations and underdevelopment.

Trying to impose a single central government on Burma doesn't bring stability, it does the opposite. It causes conflict and instability. It hasn't worked for the past 70 years and decades of military rule have destroyed trust that it could work.

An alternative to the single central state structure which has contributed to conflict and instability is being built from the bottom up. When the Burmese military are forced out of an area, new devolved administrations expand into the space created. Some are authoritarian themselves, but many others are not. They are engaging in long consultations with local people about what they want and need, and what kind of government they want. Local people are gaining more control of their lives, identity, religion and natural resources. They are providing schools and health services. This is not just happening in ethnic states, but also other parts of the country liberated from Burmese military occupation.

This is the process the international community should be supporting. Bottom up democracy built mile by mile. What has been achieved with little or no international support so far is remarkable. It offers a viable, if unfamiliar, alternative to ongoing Burmese military dominance, with much better long-term prospects for peace and economic development than that offered by the Burmese military.

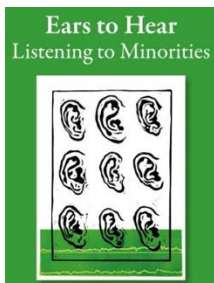
